Welcome

During 2022-2023 Worcester City Council will spend £23.4 million providing essential services to you. Our costs are increasing in line with inflation so this year our element of your Council Tax bill will rise by around 1p per day in order to help us protect your services.

The Government is providing a £150 one-off Energy Bills Rebate for most households in Council Tax bands A to D. More information is on the enclosed leaflet or at

Worcester City Council collects the Council Tax on behalf of Worcestershire County Council, the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for West Mercia, Hereford & Worcester Fire and Rescue Authority and, where necessary, your local parish council. The total amount is then split to provide the services that are part of your everyday life.

This year, the majority of Band D households in Worcester will pay £1,936.72 to their local authorities - that's just £37.24 a week.



Direct Debit –the best way to pay

Life is stressful enough at the moment, so make yours a little easier by paying your bill by Direct Debit – it can save you money, time and effort (because you only need to set it up once, not every year).

Over 75% of households in Worcester already pay this way – all you need to do is give us your bank account details and we can do the rest.



You have a choice of monthly payment dates - the 1st, 10th, 15th or 25th of the month, whichever suits you best.

And remember – your payments will always be covered by the Direct Debit guarantee.

Investing in your city

This year the Council is working on improvements and projects which will invest more than £1 million in the city.

- £200,000 to install more electric vehicle charging points in car parks
- £100,000 to create a new play area off Cotswold Way in Warndon, with environmental enhancements
- £30,000 to help the city's communities celebrate The Queen's Platinum Jubilee
- £30,000 for celebrations of the Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games
- £48,000 to support biodiversity in the city
- £60,000 to build a new BMX pump track in St Peter's
- £140,000 to create a new community facility area in the Comer Gardens Institute
- £80,000 to further improve street-cleaning in the city
- £10,000 for a campaign to combat drink-spiking
- £40,000 to support Worcester's Citizen's Advice Bureau
- £100,000 to boost the take-up of walking and cycling by employing a dedicated active travel officer

Regenerating Worcester

Worcester City Council is rolling out more than £40 million of Government funding to regenerate areas of the city.

£17.9 million is being invested from the Future High Street Fund in the regeneration of the northern end of the city centre, around Angel Street and Angel Place. Among other benefits, this scheme will bring the re-opening of a restored Scala Theatre and Corn Exchange, and an improved public realm.

The investment of a further £19.6m from the Towns Fund will bring:

- improvements to the city's museums and heritage attractions;
- the regeneration of Shrub Hill;
- the creation of a new 'Building Block' construction skills centre in Dines Green and other community skills training initiatives;
- the completion of the new Severn Centre for Health and Wellbeing in Hylton Road;
- active travel initiatives including new and improved walking and cycling routes, a bike hire scheme, and a significant contribution to the new Kepax bridge across the Severn.

The Arches

Five of the Victorian railway arches close to The Hive have now been refurbished, and four of them will soon open as spaces for local artists and creatives, while the fifth will become an exciting new public performance area. This is part of The Arches – Worcester scheme, supported by £3m from the Cultural Development Fund, aimed at creating a new cultural destination for the city. It also includes the successful Arches Festivals programme (which runs the Light Night Worcester and other events) and the creation of a new route linking Foregate Street Station with The Hive and the riverside.

The City Council's share of the total Band D Council Tax is £200.88; this is a £5 rise on the previous year, but the increase is lower for the majority of city households.

Your Council Tax bill also includes charges for Worcestershire County Council, the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for West Mercia, Hereford & Worcester Fire and Rescue Authority.

Preferred methods of payment



This has been another extraordinary year for us all.

The impacts of the global pandemic have been wide ranging, affecting health & wellbeing, to the knock-on effects on education, supply chains and the economy.

However, the remarkably successful vaccination programme in our County means we can now safely move on to focus on recovery and wider initiatives to support our residents and businesses.

We continue to listen to what is important to our residents and this is reflected in our budget this year. We are funding a record £25 million extra for adults and children's social care to protect the most vulnerable in our society.

At the same time, we are investing in the things that residents tell us are important and need improving, such as better roads and pavements, tackling congestion and improving public transport.

We are doing all this whilst keeping the level of our Council Tax to one of the very lowest of any County Council in the country. The increase is less than inflation and equivalent to £1 per week for a Band D property.

I know the months ahead will remain challenging and I can assure you that the County Council will be doing all it can to support those in need and help to provide a better future for all those who choose to live and work in our County.
